


Junie B. Jones Is Not a Crook





by Joan Sweeney






Miss Nelson Is Missing


How do you show respect in school? What does respect “look like”? What does it “sound like?” Tell Character Ed about how you are a very respectful person!

by Dr. Seuss



by Phillip and Hannah Hoost


